



Dear LCS Family,

irstly, we would like to acknowledge and welcome those families who have joined the Lighthouse Christian School community in term two. It is wonderful to have you with us! We count it a privilege to be entrusted with partnering with you in the education of your child.

ACADEMICS

In our Primary Department, we are continuing to roll out our new evidence-based phonics and spelling program, Write2Spell2Read. During the April student free days, we had the developer of this program at our campus to lead our primary teachers and teacher aides in building their expertise in delivering this program. This training has complemented the professional development our staff had earlier in the year with an external practitioner who has been effectively working with this program for the past three years.

This month, our year eleven cohort is participating in an English External Testing Trial from QCAA (Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority). Our school was successful in its application to be a part of this trial program. Changes to Secondary Education through the new tertiary ranking system will firstly impact our current year nines. Recent information from the QCAA is that at least 25% of assessments will be in the form of an external exam. With these changes coming, it is wonderful that our school is able to be a part of this state-wide trial.

You would be aware that students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 were involved in NAPLAN testing earlier this month. Schools, students and parents will receive the results of these tests in August. At Lighthouse, we see these tests as providing an important indicator of our school's progress. It is important that at school, class and individual student level, we are seeing improvement year by year so that we can monitor our teaching practices and programs, ensuring that your child is receiving a learning experience of the highest standard.

SPIRITUAL GROWTH

Praise and Worship continues at LCS every Monday morning during our school assembly and again at our two chapel services (Primary - Wednesday / Secondary - Friday). These occasions are precious times in our school week. The impact of a worshipful life has a profound effect on every area of our being, leading to an ever increasing desire to love Jesus, become like Jesus, and communicate Jesus. The number of students involved in Praise and Worship ministry across both our Primary and Secondary departments increases by the month. Parents and friends are most welcome to join us during these occasions.

This month, for the very first time, LCS is entering choirs in the Rockhampton Eisteddfod. Our primary students performing Colin Buchanan's Old Black Crow. In the refrain it says "There's one thing for sure, we are worth much more to the God who cares for people too!" Our secondaries are presenting "Still" and "Always Enough", two gospel songs, the refrain of the latter declaring "Your love is peace to the broken, faith for the widow, hope for the orphan, strength for the weak!" What a promise! I commend our students for their bold declarations of God's goodness to a packed Pilbeam Theatre. Win, lose or draw, our students will return to school having communicated the

timeless and precious message of Hope in God to the Rockhampton community!

SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL DEVELOPMENT

In recent weeks I have had the privilege of meeting with several new and existing parents to discuss their experiences here at Lighthouse Christian School and what they see and expect for their children both now and into the future. What is clearly apparent is the appreciation shown among parents for the care, nurture and support for students, particularly those at educational and social risk that exists at LCS. I have seen parents moved to tears when they have shared their gratitude for how school staff have for many years, provided a safe, caring, compassionate and supportive place for their children to learn and grow. The social and emotional development of each and every student in our community is of the utmost importance to us. This part of our school culture is priceless and is something that we work earnestly to nurture and protect.

PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

Students across our primary and secondary departments have continued their involvement in the Rockhampton Interschool Sports Competitions. One recent highlight was the performance of our secondary girls' basketball team who finished runners up in their competition. Students are currently involved in netball (girls), basketball (secondary boys) and hockey (primary boys).

This past week, our Inter-house Carnival was a wonderful occasion. In addition to the fun and participation, the day acted as a selection trial for LCS's participation in the upcoming Rockhampton Schools Track and Field Carnival. We will be sending a strong team to this event, which will be held at Rockhampton State High School early next term.

Last month, our LCS Cross Country Team participated in the District Cross Country Trials at Kalka Shades. Over one thousand students competed in events across the day with our school well represented in many events.

Finally, on behalf of our team of school staff, I thank members of our school community for the multiple ways in which you support us and contribute to the life of our school. All of this contributes to our continuing journey in living out our motto of providing Excellence in Christian Education for every student, in every classroom, every day!

This is such a great opportunity for our students and yet again, another way that the leadership of Lighthouse Christian School is intentionally seeking to widen the scope of opportunity for growth, equipping, training and preparation for our students to be the finest young people that the workforce has ever seen.


heart and I just stopped running from Him and accepted Jesus into my heart as my personal Saviour.

I went down and checked again and to my surprise the tank was suddenly full! It stayed full for the rest of that year. After that I couldn't question God's presence and can say He is still in the miracle business.

Lighthouse School Community recognises the ANZAC tradition - the ideals of courage, endurance and mateship that were established on 25 April, 1915 when the Australian and New concluded the parade with a moving Zealand Army Corps landed on the Gallipoli Peninsula, yet are still relevant today.
