In January, we welcomed two hundred and forty new and returning students from Prep to Year 12, our highest ever enrolment. Since October last year, over eighty students have joined Lighthouse | the principles of godly living in an

for the very first time! Our team at LCS are grateful to God for this opportunity to serve families in pursuit of the Lighthouse Christian School Mission, that is:

To educate and train up a child in

atmosphere that glorifies our Lord Jesus Christ, utilising a high quality and systematic curriculum, and integrates Christian principles and a biblical world view.

In recent months, our 2017 graduates have progressed to the workforce and further learning. Our School Dux, Eli Armstrong has commenced a Bachelor of Education (Primary) degree at Central Queensland University. Eli has also joined our Primary School staff in the capacity of part time Teaching Assistant.

In January, we welcomed two new teachers, Mrs Heather Hill (Logan) to our Secondary Department and Mr Caesar Al-Samarrie to our Primary Department. Both of these teachers completed Practice Teaching experiences here at LCS during their teacher training. It has been a pleasure to have two such talented and passionate educators join our ranks. In addition, we are very pleased to have Mrs Jovelyn Dig-o join our Primary team from the start of Term Two. Jovelyn is a highly experienced teacher at primary, secondary and tertiary level and brings a strong skill set to our team.

With additional student enrolments, we have increased our Teacher Aide support across both the Primary and Secondary Departments of our school, appointing four former students to the roles of part time Teaching Assistants, these being Eli Armstrong, Gabrielle Knobel and Erin Hafner to the Primary School, and Jonah Harp to Secondary. Both Eli and Jonah have commenced Bachelor of Education degrees this year while Gabrielle and Erin are progressing with their Teacher Aide qualification.

Again this year, our School Improvement Agenda focusses on LCS School Staff developing excellence in Effective Pedagogical (Teaching) Practice. Our school

systems for teacher coaching and development continue to ensure a range of high-yield effective evidence-based strategies are embedded across all Prep to Year 12 classrooms every day.

In 2018, our School Improvement Priorities to be embedded in daily teacher/classroom practice include:

- Establishing a Culture that Promotes Learning through the embedding of the Ten Essential Skills for Classroom Management;
- Data Informed Decision Making, with an aspirational target of 100% of students making adequate yearly progress in English, Maths and Science (P-12);
- Effective Pedagogical Practice through the embedding of Explicit Instruction and Student Feedback:
- Differentiated Teaching and Learning to support the adequate yearly progress of every student both academically and socially/ emotionally.
- Preparation of Senior Secondary Staff for the introduction of the new Senior Assessment Tertiary Entrance (SATE) from 2019.

Our work across these areas continues to be rigorous. Our Student Free Days, Weekly Staff Meetings, and Coaching and Mentoring Programs ensure we as a staff are continuing to develop our teaching capabilities.

With the support of our School Board, LCS has invested considerably in the advancement of our schools ICT Hardware and Connectivity. From the start of Term Two, every student from Year 10 to Year 12 will

be provided with a Macbook while all students in Year 5 and Year 6 will have their learning opportunities enhanced with our 1:1 iPad roll-out. Further, the School's Leadership and Board have targeted funding to provide our students with these high quality devices whilst continuing to maintain an affordable fee structure.

From Term One, we have introduced two new subjects into our Senior School offering: Maths C (now face to face) and Drama in Practice; while in the Early Years, our Year 1 Violin Program, piloted in 2017 and one of only a handful of such programs in Queensland schools, continues to thrive (see pages 16-17).

We trust you enjoy reading this edition of the Lantern, which informs and celebrates the highlights of Term One at LCS! We thank God for His hand upon us in our journey.

Looking forward to seeing you in and around our school throughout the year.






uring the weekend of the 9th and 10th of March, I had the privilege of attending the Drama Queensland state conference in Brisbane as a winner of the Robin Thomas Bursary. The Robin Thomas Bursary is awarded to one beginning teacher each year, as a tribute to the late Robin Thomas. It was an honour to receive such a prestigious award as Robin dedicated much of her life to drama and mentoring new drama teachers throughout the beginning of their career. The

opportunity to attend this conference was incredible as it brought together drama teachers from across the state to learn how to better their practice.

Many key notes focused on the new curriculum implementations and how to combine the new with the old, supporting teachers to understand how to best support students through this transitional time. One keynote that really stood out was a drama teacher who now

uses the skills of drama to assist paramedics and critical servicemen on better supporting their team and patients. Reminding everyone that the work of a drama teacher extends far beyond the classroom. Additionally many speakers sought to inspire again every teacher on the real purpose of teaching - to impact our students. This was then displayed through a case study highlighting the importance of arts in education and the overarching positive academic outcomes that have been reported since the inclusion of arts. Additionally the Queensland Academies Creative Industries also put on a stupendous show performed by their students reinforcing the talent and potential that each student has.

For me this professional development was a doorway to making drama at Lighthouse the best it can be, ensuring students are participating in a meaningful practice that can support them throughout their life. For the LORD is good; his mercy is everlasting; and his truth endureth to all generations.


Psalm 100:5

DEVELOPING OUR STEM PROGRAM

cience is the subject that most clearly shows how our world has been organised by a God of order. It is my great privilege to be able to help students discover the wonders of creation directly through hands on experiments and practical activities.

International research indicates that 75 per cent of the fastest growing occupations now require science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) skills and knowledge. Nationally we have a shortage of students undertaking STEM related tertiary studies, a problem and a missed opportunity that can be traced back to student

disengagement with these subjects in the middle schooling years.

A number of reports have argued that science education needs to be more inquiry-orientated and involve authentic and practical investigations to develop scientific literacy and better engage students in science learning. This is where the role of STEM Operations Officer comes in - to provide the science teachers with technical support in organising practicals to better engage students in scientific learning. To be able to fill this role to the best of my ability I will be working towards a Certificate IV in Laboratory Techniques.

It has been very rewarding to see the students' enthusiasm for science bloom during the experiments that I have prepared under the direction of the teachers. The students' critical thinking and understanding has been visibly enhanced.

This year we plan to further boost the profile of STEM in the school during our Science and Technology Fair, which will be held in Term 3 during Science Week, which runs from the 11-19th of August. Students will have the opportunity to develop a science or technology idea through the year and present their investigations and projects at the fair.

I am looking forward to seeing what discoveries and inventions our students will produce as they enquire into this amazing world God has given us.

In this issue of the Lantern, we are interviewing Mrs Brigitte Milschus. Mrs Milschus has been part of the Lighthouse Christian School family for over 20 years and is well loved by countless students and staff, past and present. She has recently shifted from teaching to play a new and exciting role in our school, which we talk about in this Q&A!

WHERE ARE YOU FROM ORIGINALLY?

I originally came from Germany with my husband. We have three children who attended Lighthouse Christian School since I started to work here in 1996.

WHAT DO YOU DO HERE AT LCS?

My role now is STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) Operations Officer where I am helping to enhance our Science program. I also work with EAL/D Students (students who speak another language), Year 3 & 5 NAPLAN Intervention and learning support mostly with Year 7-12 students.

WHAT IS YOUR NORMAL MORNING ROUTINE BEFORE WORK?

I get up at 6 o'clock every morning. I read a portion of the Bible and a short devotion written by Charles Spurgeon. This helps me to start my day well and focus on the word of God.

WHAT DO YOU LOOK FORWARD TO MOST IN A DAY?

In my new role I like it when the students are excited about the experiments we are doing and they ask pointed questions to help them in their understanding.

With my EAL/D students I enjoy their ability to express themselves in English and how quick they are progressing.

WHEN AND HOW DID YOU BECOME A CHRISTIAN?

After coming to Australia we had to find our own way spiritually. We were starting to read the Bible and wanted to find a group of people who taught biblical truths. When we came to Rockhampton I went to a playgroup offered by the Frenchville Brethren and so we went to fellowship with them. On the 20th of January 1990, I made a public commitment to Jesus Christ and then followed Him in baptism.


TELL US ABOUT ONE MOMENT THAT STANDS OUT AS GOD WORKING IN YOUR LIFE.

We used to walk past the back of the school before there were any houses built and I said to my husband, "I



I never knew that I would speak English every day when I started to learn the language in Grade 5. In Grade 8, I had to do an assignment on Australia and this prepared me for where God was going to bring me in the future! There is a plan for everyone, we just see it in hindsight. ■







TEN ESSENTIAL SKILLS FOR CLASSROOM MANAGEMENT

The LCS team continues to prioritise the capability development of every staff member. During January's Student Free Days, Teachers and Teacher Aides worked with Jill McPherson, Educational Consultant with EdStrategic, on the Essential Skills for Classroom Management program, devised from the research of Christine Richmond.

Essential Skills for Classroom Management enables educators to foster a calm and supportive classroom through effective management. It covers topics such as: setting clear expectations, acknowledging appropriate behaviour, timely correction of inappropriate behaviour and exploring the 10 essential skills in practice.

This is the second year that our team has worked with Jill. Her support of the whole of school staff and her work with our four school Profilers has ensured a positive transition of this program across all classrooms.

PREPARATION FOR SATE (SECONDARY ASSESSMENT TERTIARY ENTRANCE)

Our Senior Secondary Teachers continue to network with other teachers both locally and statewide to ensure our readiness for the introduction of the new Senior Schooling Syllabuses coming on board in 2019. Training has occurred both at school, and through regional and state forums.

DRAMA QUEENSLAND STATE CONFERENCE

In March, our Drama in Practice Teacher (via a scholarship), attended the Drama Queensland State Conference in Brisbane over two days. As we launch into this new subject area for us, the importance of ensuring strong professional networks, training and resourcing is essential.

GUIDING PRINCIPLES FOR CULTIVATING SUSTAINABLE CHRISTIAN SCHOOL CULTURE

With a collective total in excess of fifty years in Christian Schooling, Ps John Buchholz and Ps Robert Bakss lead staff in professional development and training in Christian Schooling principles including sessions on the purpose of Christian schooling, Commitment to a Biblical World View, and Making an Imprint for God.

SUPPORTING STUDENTS WITH TRAUMA AND ANXIETY

In January, staff from Evolve, EdLinQ and Child Youth and Mental Health Services worked with school staff in developing and improving the way schools and class teachers make appropriate adjustments to successfully support students suffering from trauma and anxiety.

VISIT TO HIGH PERFORMING SCHOOLS

In March, Principal Blair Harp and Deputy Principal Alice Bakss joined with Educational Consultant and friend of Lighthouse Christian School, Mrs Ngaire Tagney to visit and speak with the Leadership Teams of three High Performing Schools in the South East corner. The visit focused on professional conversations around the high yield and evidence-based teaching and learning strategies that are used which ensure these schools are among the best performing in Queensland.

COLLINS WRITING PROGRAM

Our P-9 Curriculum Coordinator and Junior Secondary English Teacher Jasmin Smyth spent two days with international educator, academic and author, John Collins. The Collins Writing Program is designed to improve students' thinking and writing skills simultaneously. The core elements of this program will further enhance our school's priority around daily writing practices and complement the Big Write Program which operates from Prep to Year 12.






