As a school staff, entrusted with partnering parents in the education of their children, we continue in our commitment to providing intentional Excellence in Christian Education every session, every day.

WELCOME NEW STAFF 2019

Mr Andrew Hill, a recent graduate of Christian Heritage College in Brisbane and current employee in a local secondary science faculty, joins our Secondary Team from the start of 2019. Mr Hill is passionate about Science and Mathematics and is a gifted musician. He and his wife, Heather, a Lighthouse Secondary Teacher, are active in the life of Lighthouse Baptist Church and are integral members of the Worship Team.

A rigorous Selection and Recruitment process has seen a high number of applicants express interest in furthering their teaching ministry at Lighthouse from 2019. COMMITMENT TO EXCELLENCE IN CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

As a school staff we have continued with passion and intentionality to progress our school's goals of Academics, Spiritual Growth, Social and Emotional Development and Physical Development. Some notable celebrations include:

ACADEMICS

NAPLAN

- 100% students in Years 3, 5, 7, 9 attaining National Minimum Standard in 2018 NAPLAN testing in Numeracy, the only school in the Rockhampton region to do so;
- Year 5-7 and 7-9 Writing double the National Growth Rate;
- Year 5-7 Spelling more than double the National Growth Rate;

• Growth at or greater than the National Growth in 13 out of 15 areas!

Reading Outcomes

- ISQ (Independent Schools Queensland) identified 12 out of 212 Independent Schools that are making significant gains in reading (identified by NAPLAN) over a period of many years (LCS is one of the 12!).
- LCS invited by ISQ to participate in a Reading Research Project to contribute to the body of research regarding school practices leading to improvements in reading results for students.

Senior Schooling Outcomes

 As at Semester 2 this year, LCS has significantly increased the number of students attaining VHAs (Very High Achievement) in Senior Secondary, including a VHA10, the highest state rating possible.

Film, Television and New Media:

 Senior FTV students participated in the Queensland Regional School's Short Film Festival held in Maryborough with Lighthouse students taking out six of the twelve awards on offer.

SPIRITUAL GROWTH

- Significant numbers of students attaining Scripture Memorisation expectations;
- Increased numbers of students involved in leading Praise and Worship in both Primary and Secondary;
- Increased numbers of students involved in the school's Praise and Worship Ministry.

SOCIAL & EMOTIONAL DEVELOPMENT

- Additional teacher training and support to enhance Differentiated Student Learning;
- Increased support time in Secondary to support Students with Additional Needs;
- Lunch-time programs including games, robotics and science moments.

PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

- Participation in Rockhampton Secondary School Sports including Futsal, Basketball and Volleyball Competitions;
- Participation in the Qld Schools Table Tennis Championships (Silver in Junior Division, Gold in Open Division);
- Participation in Rockhampton Primary School Competitions (Basketball, Hockey, Soccer);
- Participation in Rockhampton District Cross Country;
- Inter-house Athletics Carnival.

FUTURES PLANNING

With unprecedented growth in recent years, we are embarking on a building program which in the initial stage will see four additional teaching spaces built on the north-eastern boundary of the property. Two of these classrooms will be ready for use from the commencement of 2019.

Following the successful rollout of Phase 1 of our P-12 iPad/MacBook program in 2018, we will be expanding this further in 2019 with all students from Y5 to Y12 issued with a device (1:1) and increased numbers of iPads across the P-Y4 Classrooms. Infrastructure upgrades have continued throughout the year in preparation for this expanded program. More to come.

We thank God for His continued grace and leading of our school community. We acknowledge the continued prayer and commitment of the school's parents and church membership into the lives of the next generation and to seeing that every student at Lighthouse Christian School develops so as to see 1 Timothy 4:12 in action.




Psalm 18:32

n 2018, Lighthouse began offering Drama in Practice as an elective for senior students in Years 10-12. Throughout the year students have completed excursions to Bangarra Dance company performances for analysis, participated in short improvised performances based on the 'Commedia Dell'arte' genre and during Term 3 sought to create a large-scale performance for their peers. With the inspiration of Max Lucado's "You are Special" and the Hillsong worship song "Who You Say I Am", I wrote a modernised version of the beloved story seeking to tell the tale of challenges of societal acceptance and finding true identity in God within the new setting of a technologically charged world.

After numerous rounds of auditions with a display of incredible talents from all, each student prayerfully took on a role to not only transform their own practice but those who viewed the play. This began the long process of memorising lines, repetition of the same scene over and over and over and rehearsals both within and outside class times. This process took time, hard work and sacrifice from all those involved including dedicated parents with the final product exceeding all expectations. This play not only was a learning experience but also a journey of growth as students found their characters became an extension of themselves. As Chace put it, "I got to act out a character that I related to, allowing me to express myself in a different way."

The story followed the people within the township of 'Rockport' who lived in a world where people were ranked through an app of likes and dislikes with those receiving likes seen as popular and accepted and those with dislikes being excluded. While Tori and her friends Will and Jayce spent so much time disliked they wanted an answer to see if anyone truly knew them and Tori found her true identity through her Creator God explaining she is "who You say I am". This sparked change within the community helping Tori to bring her friends and family to the Creator, even being able to touch the life of the popular egocentric Alexis who discovered with one of the Creators helpers Thomas, no amount of likes truly mean anything other than her identity in Christ. This allowed for the community of Rockport to become united and not only follow but apply the new identities they found in God.

Through tears from laughter the drama class became a team, each finding new friendships and bonding through the process. Each student grew in incredible ways developing their sense of drama and displaying keen dramatic skills; but most importantly as students Emily and Gabriella explained, "We learnt about other people and created really strong friendships." Each student discovered new strengths in themselves, as Ashleigh the narrator explained, "I found that I could push myself to achieve something new" and with many of their peers noticing a change about them with some commenting they had never heard

their friend really talk like that before the performance. In fact, a student reported that through this performance he was able to speak in front of a hundred people when last year they couldn't speak in front of their class. This was God at work,













revealing each students gifts and talents as they performed for Him. Not only was this a process of personal educational development and growth but students learnt more about their true identity with Vimbainashe reflecting, "It helped me realise I shouldn't be thinking too much about what others think of me but instead I should just be going to God."

The heart of the performance was to communicate the love of Christ in a new



way, showing how no matter what others think He loves everyone and seeks to have them know their true identity in Him. The students wanted this message to be clear as Gabriella put it, "I hope that the students from Lighthouse will know they are not alone and find comfort in the stories presented through drawing closer to God" because as Paul explained, "It was a lot of work but it was rewarding because it didn't just change me, but others' lives for God."

areers - it is a daunting thing to consider your life's work when you are barely out of year nine but that is what Careers, the class, is all about.

Careers for year ten students at LCS is more about the students discovering what they think might be the direction they want to follow. Over the course of term one they spend time in selfreflection; analysing their gifts, talents, interests and skills. They also analyse what they possibly could do in the future if they had the ability to do certain courses or participate in particular activities. In term two, students research jobs they are interested in or industries that appeal to them. It is usually because of this research that students decide what they would like to do for term three and their work experience week.

Work Experience this year was just as diverse as it has been in the past. We had students shadowing law firms, speech pathologists and nutritionists. Others were allowed to participate in the workplace with electricians, childcare providers, the hospitality and beauty industries and even the art gallery. A select group of students participated in a special medical program at the Mater Misericordiae Rockhampton, organised to have the students experience all areas of health and medical care. The stand out profession that was new to the work experience pool was a student choosing a radio station.

All in all, the students took the opportunity to explore their interests and talents, consider multiple careers and reflect on their work placement experiences to finalise their ideas on their futures.

Careers, the class, for the year ten students of 2018 allowed them to prepare for their SET plans and help them develop and design a strategy for subject selection and how to move forward into 2019.

I look forward to seeing what the future graduates of 2020 accomplish next year but also what the year ten students of 2019 will make of their Careers class and work experience week. ■

AN AMAZING FILMMAKING EXPERIENCE

n Friday October 26, our very own Film and Television class had the amazing opportunity to participate in filmmaking workshops conducted by Arun Ketsirat Gartner – a Director, Producer, Cinematographer and Griffith University Honour Student. The workshops were held at Riverside Christian College in Maryborough where the students travelled to the day before. On Friday, the students began their day by participating in their first workshop which taught the students about the importance of storytelling in film. They participated in an activity where the students created their own logline which other students contributed to finishing by writing the escalation and punchline of the story. After morning tea, the students separated into two groups which participated in different exercises with the other students. Group A learnt how to use lighting correctly in film and used scripts provided by Arun to create their own films using Griffith's own film equipment. Group B on the other hand, separated into groups of 5 where scriptwriters, directors, cinematographers and actors were allocated inside the teams. Each group designed their own short films by

writing a script and using props from the backstage of the school's multipurpose hall to help them bring their films to life. In the next session, these groups filmed their stories, while Group A also



wrote their own scripts and filmed them. Towards the end of the workshops, Arun encouraged the students to dig deeper into their passions and pursue a career that fits their own interests and talents in filmmaking. She introduced the students to Griffith University and the facilities, courses and opportunities that they provide for anyone interested in film, animation and games design.

In the afternoon, the students attended the Regional Queensland Student Film Festival (RQSFF) held at the Brolga Theatre in Maryborough to watch their own films which they had created at school and the films of students from other schools. After the showing, they held an award ceremony which awarded the best film from each of the five various genres and awards for the overall Best story, Production Design/Costuming, Cinematography, Sound Design, Special Effects Makeup, Visual Effects and Best editing out of all the films entered. Out of these 12 awards, our students walked away with 6 of them - 3 being the overall best film from their genre and 3 awards for recognition of specific skills in the overall films. Jesse Harp, Julian Brumpton, Ruan Pretorious and Philip Quinn's film "Red Nights" was awarded Best Horror Film. Julian Brumpton and Jesse Harp's music video "Wonder" was awarded Best Music Video and Lydia West's film "Duality" was awarded Best Art Film. In addition to that, the "Red Nights" film team won an award for Best Cinematography and Emilee-Joy and Lydia won the Best Story and Best Production Design/Costuming for their film "Sea Butterflies".



Overall, from this event the students were able to not only learn more about filmmaking at a higher level but had the privilege of meeting and connecting with other students who had similar passions and interests as them. The students found it a great privilege and opportunity to gain advice from a qualified university lecturer and experienced filmmaker who specializes in various fields of filmmaking. All in all, the students had an insightful, exciting experience and enjoyed seeing the effort and time they put into their films pay off. ■





How to create and annotate screen captures on Mac OS

Here's how

you can create an annotated screen

capture so you can include snippets of important information directly as you see it on screen, into a document of your own.

On the Mac there are two important keyboard shortcuts for capturing what you see on screen:

Shift-Command-3 takes a picture of your entire screen

Shift-Command-4 allows you to choose the section of the screen you want to capture

When you use these key combinations a png picture file named something like "Screen Shot 2018-mm-dd at hh.mm.sss am/pm") is placed on your desktop. You can open/copy/paste/crop/resize/export this picture file but did you know you can also draw lines and shapes, draw freehand and even type text over it? Use these steps:

- **1. Take a screenshot** using one of the key combinations above.
- **2. Double-click the screenshot file** on the desktop to open it in the Preview app.
- 3. Click the Tools menu and select "Annotate" and you'll see a number of options for drawing lines, shapes and positioning text. Alternatively you can click the View menu and select "Show Markup Toolbar" to show these tools in a toolbar.
- 4. Each item you add to the picture can be moved around to size, position and colour everything just right.
- 5. Save the file when you are finished, or just copy/paste it into your document.

Here's an example of how you might annotate a screenshot using preview:




