I was born in South Africa and in 2002 my family immigrated to Australia. I have lived in Rockhampton for the last 10 years. Before that, my family lived in various towns around Australia.

WHAT DO YOU DO HERE AT LCS?

I work in the LCS primary school as the Year 2 Teacher.

DID YOU ALWAYS WANT TO BE AN EARLY CHILDHOOD TEACHER?

Ever since I was a little girl, I wanted to be a teacher. As a little child, I used to play teachers with my friends and Mum. I also had this kids chalkboard and I would pretend to present lessons to my dolls and teddies. I always pictured myself working with young children. I was once obsessed with the movie 'Matilda'. WHAT DO YOU LOOK FORWARD TO MOST IN A DAY?

The saying goes..."Another day, another dollar". I like to change this saying to... "Another day, another opportunity to impactalife". Therefore, Imostlookforward to the moments where I can be a blessing to others. I look forward to opportunities where I change a person's day through a smile, a happy greeting, prayer, a listening ear, a word of encouragement, offering my services and apositive outlook. Additionally, I am motivated to continue my work when watching my students grow into the people God has created them to be.

WHAT ARE YOUR GOALS AS A TEACHER?

I aspire to help children grow holistically where their whole being is developed. The purpose of education is to develop students academically; however, I wish for more for my students. I want them to also grow spiritually, emotionally, socially and physically. I also aim to instill a love of learning in the children that I interact with. I think this is important because even as adults we are continuously learning.

WHEN AND HOW DID YOU BECOME A CHRISTIAN?

I grew up in a Christian family so I have been exposed to Christianity my whole life. In 2014, my family began attending Oasis New Life Centre in Rockhampton. Each year, the church holds a revival week and has a visiting pastor

called Deon Hockey. During a revival service, I accepted Jesus as my Lord and Saviour. Then in 2016, I got water baptised.

WHAT IS ONE MOMENT THAT STANDS OUT AS GOD WORKING IN YOUR LIFE?

One of the most significant moments that stands out as God working in my life is when I was offered the position at Lighthouse Christian School. I am still in awe of the way that God worked in my life and purposefully placed me at LCS. A few years ago, a good friend of mine brought me along to a Live Out Loud service. She gave me a tour of the school and I remember saying to God that I would love to teach at Lighthouse. Until this tour, I did not know that LCS existed. After this time, I continued studying for several years. Upon finishing my degree, I applied to teach with the Catholic Education Diocese of Rockhampton; however, I didn't really want to go out west nor was I in a financial position to go out west. I remained faithful that God would provide.

One day, I decided to look for teaching

positions on Seek. It was on this day that I found the advertised position at Lighthouse. Knowing that I did not want to go out west, I decided to apply. I still remember the day that Mr Harp phoned me offering me the position at Lighthouse. I was beyond excited and I was blown away by the blessing that God has given me. As I think back about my journey, I am amazed at how God planned everything, even down to the detail of my friend giving me a tour which lead me to know about Lighthouse.

WHAT IS A PIECE OF ADVICE YOU WOULD LIKE TO PASS ON TO OUR STUDENTS WHO ARE GRADUATING THIS YEAR?

Trust in Jesus Who is your strength. We cannotdolifeinourownstrength;however, with God all things are possible. For me, 2019 has been one of the most difficult years being a first year teacher (university does not prepare you for the real world of teaching). Many times I have felt out of my depth and not good enough. I have learnt that God's love never fails; He is constant and we are never alone. No matter the situation, He will either catch you or teach you how to fly. Always remember Isaiah 41:10 – "Do not fear, for I am with you; do not be dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you and help you; I will uphold you with my righteous right hand." ■

verthe past few months we have been working with Digistorm to develop a school app to streamline communication with our school families and it's finally ready to roll out! Our app can be downloaded from the App Store or Google Play, just search for 'Lighthouse Christian School' and start the download.

The app currently has 6 modules up and running including Notices, Calendar, News, Sport, Newsletter and Absentees. Presently, we use email as our main point of contact for all communication – we will now use the app as we are able to filter notices in a more efficient manner using the app. To ensure you don't receive unnecessary notifications, all you need to do is go to the Settings cog and under 'Subscriptions' select only the year levels and activities that apply to your child/ children. Simple!

- Open the App store and search 'Lighthouse Christian School';
- Download and open the app;
- You will be prompted to allow the app to access your calendar – if you would like to sync the school calendar with your personal calendar, select 'ok';
- Next you will be prompted to allow the app to send you notifications. Please ensure you select 'allow'. You can fine tune the notifications on the next page so you aren't receiving notifications that don't relate to you;
- Select the 'Settings' cog which will be located at the bottom right of your screen;

• Select 'Notifications' – please make sure your Push Notifications are ON;

• Select 'Subscriptions' – please make sure you select only the activities/year levels that pertain to your

child/children so that you don't receive unnecessary notifications;

If you are having any troubles with the app specifically, please go to the 'Settings' cog, go to App Feedback and leave your comments there. This will be sent to administration who will endeavour to rectify the issue promptly.

A MODERN DAY MIRACLE

"There are only two ways to live your life. One is as though nothing is a miracle. The other is as though everything is a miracle." - Albert Einstein

nthe last 5 months I have had countless transfusions, and each time I would spend a good deal of time watching whatever it was filter into my body and wonder at the miracle of life and modernmedicine. Without the transfusions, I wouldn't bewriting this now, and I can't help but praise a God who made sure I was born in an era and country where we have become so used to the every-day miracles that we take them for granted and consider them normal, because one in three Australians will need a blood transfusion at some point in their life and they're part of our common vernacular. I started this year with a platelet count of 13. Platelets are the part of your blood that makes your blood clot. Platelets are a white-ish coloured blood product, but only one component of your blood. The normal platelet count for adults is between 150 and 400, so my low count put me in an increased risk of bleeding category. What this meant for me was that each time I had an invasive diagnostic procedure to keep an eye on my liver disease, I needed a platelet transfusion. These life-saving little top-me-ups only last 3-4 days in a normal person but because I'm decidedly abnormal in the health department, they were lucky if they lasted a couple of hours.





When my platelets dropped into the "we can't count that low" range because I developed an auto-immune problem that killed off the last 13, the doctors scheduled fortnightly immunoglobulin transfusions. Another blood product – an expensive one (\$10,000 a transfusion if I was paying for it myself, thank God for Medicare!). These clever little proteins are produced by white blood cells and they pushed the platelet count back over 20 long enough for me to make it to my transplant. Throughout the surgery I would have received blood and platelet transfusions and I received one red blood transfusion in the weeks after surgery and also a number of bright yellow Albumin transfusions. This is another protein found in blood plasma that has some important job like looking after the fluid in your blood cells and making sure they don't leak, among other things.

In fact, the proteins derived from plasma like Albumin and Privigen, the immunoglobulin transfusion, can be used in 18 different ways to help treat illnesses and injuries. For me, the transfusions I received helped to boost many of my failing systems until I was strong enough for those systems to work by themselves again. They stopped me from bleeding uncontrollably and made sure that there was actually blood to keep me alive. But it wasn't just me in the hospital. There were at least five other transplant recipients in my ward during my stay among the hundreds of other patients requiring transfusions on a daily basis at that one hospital. There's absolutely no doubt that blood transfusions save lives. For people like me, they're part of the miracle.

This October, Lighthouse Love (a ministry of Lighthouse Baptist Church) held a "Blood Donor October" event, an opportunity to come together as a church family to donate blood. his year has been a huge year for Film, TV and Media at Lighthouse Christian School. This was a year of many firsts for the Film and Media department including the undertaking of the new Year 11 QCAA Senior Film subject under the new QCAA Syllabus, the introduction of an all new senior media subject, and the participation of students in a number of new and existing external Film events.

For the first time in the history of the school, we introduced a Senior Film Camp, where students from Year 12 were able to visit top film making institutions in Brisbane and participate in workshops. Students were also able to look at post-schooling study options at various institutes including Griffith University, JMC Academy and New York Film Academy. As a bonus, our group was able to go behind the scenes at Hillsong Church in Brisbane to look at and speak to the lead members of their media and production team.

Earlier this year we received the exciting news that two of our Year 12 students came first in a CQ Young Filmmakers Competition sponsored by CQ Health. Jesse Harp and Julian Brumpton wrote, filmed and edited an anti-smoking ad called, "It All Starts with One." We are extremely proud of both of them. The boys won a \$400 gift card for the school, which went to purchasing a new Zoom H5 Field Recorder and shotgun mic. This will be used by many students in the future to achieve very high quality soundscapes for their films – thank you boys for your hard work. The Year 11 cohort has had a huge year adjusting to the new Film, Television and New Media syllabus. In this new syllabus we moved from the old OP system to the new ATAR system which aligns with schools in NSW and VIC. This new system is quite challenging, but our students have stepped up to the plate and embraced this newchallenge.Inaddition.forthefirsttime Lighthouse Christian School started a new applied subject for film called Media Arts inPractice, which has been run concurrently with the Film, Television and New Media class. This subject has a more practical approach with less written components and is a fantastic option for students looking to do an applied subject under the new ATAR system.

The Year 10 and 11 classes attended the Regional Queensland Schools Film Festival run by Riverside Christian College in conjunction with Griffith University. Students participated in Workshops run by Arun Ketsirat from Griffith University, Tulahni Little (a freelance makeup artist who has also worked in film) ran a workshop on special effects make up, and Lighthouse's own Jesse Harp ran a workshop on 10 Top Tips to improve your Filmmaking. In the evening, students attended as creening at the Brolga Theatreof their short films and awards were judgedandpresentedbyGriffithUniversity lecturer, Arun Ketsirat. Lighthouse won 9 of the 18 awards given out on the night, which is a wonderful result for our school. Adam Wojtas received 5 of the 9 trophies taking out: Best Documentary, Best Action Film, Best Story, Best Sound Design, Best Costuming. Other results included: Gabby Wenman who won Best Story and Best Cinematography and Austin Brosnan who won Best Music Video. This year was the firsttimethe Film Festival introduced a new category allowing students from years 7-9 to submit films in the Best Overall Junior Film Category. Our year 7 Students, Tillie Bleakley, Ella Tatnelland Amarlii Titmarsh, entered a music video called "Sabella" which won first place. It was a great time where students were able to showcase the films that they have been working so hard on all year and we look forward to seeing what our students can do next year.


