FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear LCS Family,

With a term remaining, we take this opportunity to reflect upon some of the highlights of the 2023 academic year thus far, as well as to look forward to the exciting events and celebrations scheduled for the final weeks. This edition of the Lantern captures many of the successes at Lighthouse in recent months; in the classroom, on the stage, sporting fields and in the hearts of our students. God continues to be good and kind to us!

As a school staff entrusted with partnering with parents in the education of their children, we continue in our

growing waiting lists across almost all grades. This has meant that School Board and School Leadership have been active in revising our school's Vision, Mission, and Master Plan

The school has also revisited its organisational structure, considering different models across similar sized and growing school communities. As a result, this semester we were pleased to advise the appointments of Mr Brett Bleakley to the position of Head of Department (Senior Secondary: Y10-12) and Mrs Rachel White to the role of Head of Department (Junior Secondary: Y7-9). Together, as part of the school's leadership team, their intentional focus will be on the systematic delivery of curriculum, the implementation of effective pedagogical practices, the development of an expert teaching team, and the analysis of student performance data across secondary.

The introduction of the Lighthouse Kindy in 2023 has been hugely successful and we thank staff for their work in providing such a significant addition to our school's offerings. Having an outstanding facility and program with such strong links to the early years structure of the school will ensure a more seamless transition for students into Prep and Primary, and better well-being, social and academic opportunities.

Our preparations for 2024 are ongoing with a rigorous recruitment program for new teaching staff in place. Interviews continue to be held and we intend to advise of appointments in the coming weeks



YEAR 5 BIOLOGY EXCURSION

This Term our Year 5 students travelled to the CQUniversity Science Labs as a part of the science unit, Animal Adaptations. Prior to the excursion, students have been learning about how different animals have been created to have special features to help them to survive in a particular environment. This excursion specifically focused on the structural features the animals have. The CQUniversity Science Labs were perfect for this purpose as they had many different skeletons and taxidermies of animals with interesting structural features, as well as expert staff that were willing to share their expertise. This allowed our learning to become a lot more authentic and hands on.











At the science labs we had 4 stations active that students rotated between. These were predator vs prey, birds, insects, and similar but different. The predator vs prey station explored how the eye position of animals are different depending on if an animal is predator or prey. The birds station looked at how different birds, while similar, have vastly different beak shapes and functions depending on their diet. The insects station allowed students to explore different insects and their intricate features up close through the microscopes. Our last station, similar but different, explored animals from around the world which have similar structural features and functions in animals that are very different and found in different places.

Our students loved having the opportunity to get up and close with the different animals and insects. A big thank you to the staff of CQUniversity for hosting us and sharing their knowledge on this topic with us.





FINE ARTS SHOWCASE

Fine Arts 2023 was Lighthouse Christian Schools largest exhibition showcase to date with over 420 students' artworks. From Prep to year 12 we saw artworks from drawings to lino prints, paintings to sculptures, watercolour to digital and for the first-time living statues. Our students studied Visual Arts, Media Arts and Drama. If you missed it you really did miss out on seeing the hard work and talent of our Lighthouse students. Congratulations to all Lighthouse students.

Primary Art students explored various medium and techniques learning about different genres of art and artists styles from Miss Inslay in term one this year. Creating portraits, landscapes and 3D object art. In term 2 student made owls, polar bears, birds, sunflowers and super heroes.

Watercolour landscapes

Year 7A and 7B students investigated ways of evoking the environment, using observation, and recording as a basis for an expressive interpretation. They looked at how artists represented environments in various ways. Learning watercolour techniques, students developed and created their own beautiful unique landscapes.

Lino Printing

Through the subjective and structural frames, Year 8A and 8B students investigated how artists use significant symbols and other visual devices to communicate personal and cultural meanings in artworks. In their own artmaking, students developed their own visual language, using signs and symbols to represent a place that has personal significance to them and create a design for a lino print.

dentity & Surrealism

Year 9 art students explored how artists communicate and express viewpoints and concepts using appropriation, collage, mixed media and surrealism. They produced a series of artworks that were conceptually linked, leading into the development of personal style and artistic intention into a resolved artwork.

Abstractable Me

Students developed a visual response to the enquiry question: How would you visually represent what it is like to live in this current age? Students focused on how artists draw inspiration from what is around them and how that inspiration influences the way artists make artworks, think about and develop as artists. In an age where we are surrounded and revolve our lives around technology, students created 2D and 3D artworks of mixed media that capture what it is like for them to live in this current age. How would you visually represent this current age?

Can I draw... portraiture

Focusing on drawing and still life and learning to draw with the right side of the brain, year 11 Visual Arts in Practice students discovered how portraits can communicate identity. They conceptualised and developed a self-portrait that expressed their identity using design considerations for finished artworks for display.

Year 12 Visual Arts in Practice – Creating an Exhibition

Exploring the world of art and business, using design processes to target specific audiences the year 12 students visited the Rockhampton Art Gallery to interview the curator with the express purpose of exploring, analysing and evaluating the decision-making process involved in displaying 2D, 3D and 4D artworks. Students organised and promoted the annual Fine Arts Exhibition at Lighthouse Christian School, creating a range of products that could market the event within the school context. Our year 12 students voted and selected one student design to use at our Fine Arts Exhibition. Mitchel Payne's design was chosen and adapted by Mia Snell.

Art as lens...

Year 11 Visual Art students developed an experimental folio looking at the material world through the concept of 'art as lens', applying different lenses or viewpoints. They explored how artists work through processes to create new ways of thinking, meaning and representation. Beginning with tangible forms as inspiration, they examined and responded to focuses of people, places, and objects, producing figurative and non-figurative representations.

Art as knowledge...

Year 12 Visual Art students framed a self-directed inquiry question in response to directed stimulus or first-hand experience. Through independent investigation of their inquiry question and application of critical thinking skills, students built knowledge about art, artist and audience to generate a personal focus and commence a body of work. They explored the concept 'art as knowledge' as they employed new knowledge inspired by their personal interests, beliefs and observations of the world.

Featuring... Living Statues

Senior Drama students were amazing. They spent hours making their costumes and learning how to apply make-up to turn themselves into stone looking statues with the support of Mrs. Alinta Sondergeld (teacher) and Katherina Neher who volunteered her skills teaching students how to body paint. They captivated audiences and intrigued the children as they raced around to find all the statues and to see if they had moved or changed positions. These students stayed in character and looked amazing.

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


ROBOTICS CHARDEDODOS BY CAESAR AL-SAMARRIE CODOTICS TEACHER

This year, some Year 9 and 10 students learned how to make interactive apps using Swift UI, designed websites, learned about networks, drew various 3D artworks with Python turtle and experimented with game development. The focus was on Computational Thinking rather than getting caught up and confused by different coding languages. As the year progressed, the technology program integrated computerbased with hands-on technologies. The main idea was to prepare students for their technological future. The students used Spike Prime, EV3s, and Edison robots. Students used spike primes and EV3 robots this year at the Robocup Junior competitions. These competitions helped the students with problem-solving, character building and resilience. As a result of these experiences, some students were successful in these competitions.

Sireli Neher, Rhyleigh Smith, David Carloff-Hall, and Izaya Mills placed second in the Secondary Dance category. Madeline Van Mello, Abigail Braun, and Dustin Ward finished first in the Open Rescue category at the Central Queensland Robotics RoboCup Junior competition. Also, Oscarine Braun and Naomi Pinero finished second in the Secondary Rescue category. Due to their success, some students entered the Robocup Junior state championships to see how they would measure against other schools from the state. Madeleine Van Mello helped with preparation and coding before the competition but was absent on the day. During the State Championships, Madeleine Van Mello (missing on the day), Abigail Braun and Dustin Ward won their division. Overall, this was a team effort by the three of them. As a result of this win, they will now participate in the Robocup Junior National Championships in Melbourne later this year. This experience was made possible by a generous donation from a silent investor who helped establish and set the foundations for robotics at Lighthouse Christian School.

The students were a product of the school's Digital Technologies program and the after - school technology club. Overall, the Digital Technologies sector is rapidly expanding at Lighthouse Christian School, and students are gaining the knowledge and skills needed for their technological future. These skills will assist them in healthcare, communication, computers and information technology, robotics and many more industries. Finally, this year, the school received approval for the ICT Gateway to Industry Schools program from the Australian Computer Society. This grant will provide much-needed resources to further education and improve future employment outcomes for our students.

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The drive to the camp took most off the day leaving from Lighthouse Christian school, on a Sunday, the drive took 7-8 hours before arriving at the first site. The camp started off in Noosa, at the same area where the year 8 camp was in 2022 and the year 7 were in 2023, which would be the last place for the year 9s to get a proper shower.

The first day was spent in a cabin assigned by gender, giving each group two different experiences, a common occurrence during the camp. The second day included a drive to the the proper camp and setting up of the tents at Charlie Camp, the team banner was made and everyone was to be assigned a different job each morning. A few hours of the day was spent at the creek where a portion of the students swam. Dinner was made by the students with the help of the guides.

The third day consisted of a 5km, steep hike towards the next camp, where they would spend two days at, the longest time they would spend at any of the camps. The students were again split off into their chosen partners of who the had shared the tent with the night before and for the rest of camp. The next day saw three students sent on a drive to the doctors after falling ill, presumably from the creek. These students were driven to Mapleton, as that was the closest doctors to the camp. Two of the three had a viral infection, whilst one had tonsillitis.

The second last day of the camp found the students travelling 11km back to Charlie Camp over Mt Allen, with one stop at the top to eat lunch it was safe to say the students were exhausted and hungry when they got back. 


